


Winter 2020 The Now In Our 22nd Year! Country Kitty B&B Casual Boarding for Feline Friends. 541

"Hi Mama.


I am not mad at you. I'm on vacation!

ARE YOU BEING TRICKED BY TREATS?

You may have noticed that those little bags of your cats favorite crunchy treats now also come "super sized". The bags and containers are so large that some of our customers have mistaken them for dry cat food.

Also, more and more wet food treats are on store shelves, adding to the confusion. Again, more than one customer has assumed that the wet treats are actually food, designed to meet the nutritional requirements of a cat. The packaging is cute, that's for sure. Friskies makes "Lil' Soups", Fancy Feast makes, "Broths", and Nutrish makes, "Purrfect Broths", just to name a few. If you read the fine print, they all say they are "cat food complements", to be fed along with a complete and balanced cat food diet. The Nutrish brand also says, "Nutritional Adequacy Statement: This product is intended for intermittent or supplemental feeding

This is not to say that wet food treats are harmful or bad for your cat, just be aware that they can't be the only thing on your cat's menu.

A bag or can of food should say: "Formulated to meet the nutritional levels established by the AAFCO Cat Food Nutrient Profiles." AAFCO is the Association of American Feed Control Officials. Its members are charged with regulating the sale and distribution of animal feeds

Keep these things in mind the next time you're shopping for your best friend. The cat food aisle can be full of surprises.


